Even with the best planning' however' tent/ camping can be an e1tremely fr!strating e1perience d!e to !ncontrolled factors s!ch as bad weather' wildlife enco!nters' and e-!ipment fail!res.

<othing can dampen the e1cited anticipation of camping more than a dar 'rainy day. Even the most advent!ro!s campers can lose some of their enth!siasm on the drive to the campsite if the s ies are dreary and damp. Ofter reaching their destination' campers m!st then :set !p camp; in the downpo!r. (his incl!des eeping the inside of the tent dry and free from m!d' getting the sleeping bags sit!ated dryly' and protecting food from the downpo!r. If the sleeping bags happen to get wet' the cold also becomes a ma+or factor. O sleeping bag act!ally provides warmth on a camping trip= a wet sleeping bag provides none. >ombining wind with rain can ca!se frigid temperat!res' ca!sing any o!tside activities to be delayed. Even inside the tent problems may arise d!e to heavy winds. & ore than a few campers have had their tents blown down beca!se of the wind' which once again begins the fr!strating tas of :setting!p camp; in the downpo!r. It is wise to chec the weather forecast before embar ing on camping trips=however' mother nat!re is often !npredictable and there is no g!arantee bad weather will be el!ded.

Onother problem li ely to be faced d!ring a camping trip is r!n/ins with wildlife' which can range from mildly annoying to dangero!s. &inor inconveniences incl!de mos-!itoes and ants. (he swarming mos-!itoes can literally drive annoyed campers indoors. If an effective repellant is not !sed' the camper can spend an interminable night scratching' which will only worsen the itch. Onts do not !s!ally attac campers' b!t eeping them o!t of the food can be -!ite an inconvenience. E1treme care m!st be ta en not to leave food o!t before or after meals. If food is stored inside the tent' the tent m!st never be left open. In addition to swarming the food' ants inside a tent can crawl into sleeping bags and clothing. O!tho!gh these insects ca!se minor discomfort' some wildlife enco!nters are potentially dangero!s. (here are many poisono!s sna es in the 7 nited States' s!ch as the water moccasin and the diamond/bac rattlesna e. When hi ing in the woods' the camper m!st be caref!l where he steps. O!so' the tent m!st never be left open. Sna es' searching for either shade from the s!n of shelter from the rain' can enter a tent.

On enco!nter between an !nwary camper and a s!rprised sna e can prove to be fatal. ?!n/ins can range from !npleasant to dangero!s' b!t the camper m!st reali2e that they are sometimes inevitable.

Perhaps the least serio!s camping tro!bles are e-!ipment fail!res= these tro!bles often plag!e families camping for the first time. (hey arrive at the campsite at night and hapha2ardly set !p their nine/person tent. (hey then settle down for a peacef!l night9s rest. Sometime d!ring the night the family is awa ened by a h!ge crash. (he tent has fallen down. Sleepily' they awa e and proceed to set !p the tent in the rain. In the morning' everyone emerges from the tent' e1cept for two. (heir sleeping bag 2ippers have gotten ca!ght. *inally' after fifteen min!tes of str!ggling' they free themselves' only to reali2e another problem. Each family member9s sleeping bag has been to!ching the sides of the tent. 0 tent is only waterproof if the sides are not to!ched. (he sleeping bags and clothing are all drenched. (otally disill!sioned with the :vacation'; the fr!strated family pac s !p immediately and drives home. E-!ipment fail!res may not seem very serio!s' b!t after campers enco!nter bad weather and annoying pests or wild animals' these fail!res can end any remaining hope for a peacef!l vacation.

(hese three types of camping tro!bles can stri e campers almost anywhere. 7 ntil some brilliant scientist invents a weather machine to control bad weather or a ind of wildlife repellant'!nl!c y campers will contin!e to sha e their fists in fr!stration. &ore than li ely' e-!ipment will contin!e to malf!nction. Even so' camping contin!es to be a favorite pastime of people all across the 7 nites States. If yo! want camping to be a happy elperience for yo!' learn to la!gh at lea y tents' bad weather' and b!gs' or yo! will find yo!rself fr!strated and !nhappy..
